**Election:**

Now we'd like to ask more specifically about last month's provincial election.

The May 9<sup>th</sup> election ended with no party winning enough seats for a majority in the legislature. The BC Liberals won 43 seats, the BC New Democratic Party (the NDP) won 41, and the Green Party of BC won three seats.

After the election, NDP Leader John Horgan and Green Leader Andrew Weaver signed an agreement where the NDP will form a minority government, and Green MLAs will support it on "supply and confidence matters" where the government would fall if the majority voted against it.

However, for the NDP to form government with support from the Greens, the parties need to defeat the BC Liberals in a confidence vote at the BC Legislature. It's not certain when this vote will take place.

Q4. There has been some discussion about what should happen next.

Some people say this uncertainty has the potential to be damaging to British Columbia, it would be better to hold another election immediately in hopes one party will win a majority of the seats.

Other people say there is no reason to hold another election right away, and that the process specified by our government system should be allowed to play out.

Q13. Broadly speaking, there are two options for British Columbia's electoral system:

B.C. could keep the current system, called First Past the Post (FPTP), in which political parties run one candidate per riding and voters in that riding cast one vote for the candidate they like best. The

candidate with the most votes – even if it's less than 50 per cent of the total number of votes cast – wins the riding.

Alternatively, B.C. could adopt a new system that allocates seats in the legislature roughly in proportion to the total number of votes a party receives, meaning a party that received 30 per cent of the popular vote would also win approximately 30 per cent of the seats. Systems that do this are called, collectively, proportional representation (PR) systems.
